Since 1999, when the Population Council first established an office in Johannesburg, our researchers have worked with a broad cross-section of South Africans that includes HIV-positive mothers, elderly caregivers, church members, miners, nurses, men who have sex with men, and many others. ### Reducing HIV Transmission

- An essential component of slowing the spread of HIV is preventing mother-to-child HIV transmission (PMTCT). Population Council researchers and our South African partner organization collaborated in evaluating a local mentor program, in which HIV-positive mothers provide support to other HIV-positive mothers and mothers-to-be. The program was found to increase the women's use of key PMTCT services and improve their sense of well-being, and is expanding into other South African provinces and other countries.
- Council researchers are developing and evaluating an innovative HIV-prevention project promoting mutual monogamy among men and women in South African churches. The project will also enhance the capacity of two local faith-based organizations to deliver such programs and services to congregations in their localities.
- Working with local partners, we are developing messages and materials on abstinence and faithfulness to be incorporated into life-skills programs for youth and are examining youths' perceptions, beliefs, and practices related to abstinence and faithfulness.
- Council social scientists have shown how schooling, work opportunities, and household characteristics influence adolescents' sexual activity, contraceptive use, and the timing of first birth. Our researchers also examined whether a school-based life

skills curriculum increased levels of knowledge about HIV and AIDS and changed adolescents' risky behaviors that could lead to infection.

- One Council study found that compared to their better-off peers, girls living in poverty become sexually active at an earlier age, are less likely to use condoms or discuss condom use with their sexual partners, and are more likely to experience nonconsensual sex.
- More than 6,000 South African women volunteers participated in the efficacy trial of the Council's first-generation candidate microbicide, Carraguard™. A successful microbicide would be a female-initiated method for reducing male-to-female transmission of HIV, and possibly other sexually transmitted infections, when used during vaginal sex.

### Providing Care and Support to Those Affected by HIV and AIDS

- In addition to helping people affected by AIDS, involving youth in caregiving reduces AIDS-related stigma in the community and increases HIV-related knowledge, attitudes, and communication. Along with a leading local NGO, we evaluated a school-based model that trains students to provide HIV education, homework assistance, and other support to orphans and vulnerable children. The study demonstrated the value of youth-to-youth services and outreach activities in a school setting and has been used by our partner NGO to expand and enhance their program.

### HIV and AIDS Treatment

- To help meet the needs of HIV-positive infants and young children in South Africa, researchers from the University of Cape Town and the Council identified successful ways to manage pediatric HIV treatment programs. We also pinpointed knowledge gaps—particularly about family-centered service delivery, which recognizes the critical role of caregivers and other family members—that need further investigation.
- Other Council projects test several models of antiretroviral therapy (ART) service delivery and approaches to ART and family planning integration.

### Reproductive Health Research

- The Council studied the feasibility and cost-effectiveness of improving public clinic services for antenatal clients by including information on HIV and other sexually transmitted infections (STIs). While overall the proportion of women receiving STI services increased, we found that, because of logistical problems, fewer than half of first-time clients actually received STI or HIV services.
- We evaluated a health service delivery project aimed at getting men more involved in women's antenatal and postnatal care. The intervention resulted in significant improvements in partners' assistance during pregnancy and in increased condom use and knowledge of condoms as a means of dual protection against pregnancy and STIs.
- We are providing technical assistance to the national department of health that supports the development of a comprehensive maternal health policy and guidelines.
- In collaboration with national and provincial departments of health, we are testing possible ways to integrate HIV-related services like counseling and testing into existing reproductive health services.
- Several current projects are aimed at reducing gender-based violence, and we are looking for effective ways to deliver HIV post-exposure prophylaxis for survivors of rape.
